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Jurassic Coast Films

The Purbeck CRP has now published three promtional Jurassic Coast videos to promote sustainable travel to the area by train. The series encourages onward journeys to Lulworth Cove and Durdle Door by bus, as well as to Swanage and Corfe Castle via the Swanage Railway - the region's most popular heritage railway.

The videos were produced by the Devon & Cornwall Rail Partnership for Purbeck CRP as part of a wider campaign in West Dorset and East Devon to promote journeys by train and connecting bus services. While these are more aimed at tourists in the main season, they also help to raise awareness of what the region has to offer with its many attractions, both natural and man-made, when planning a holiday, short break, or day trip. They are particularly aimed at young people, creating a sense of a sense of wonder at beautiful surroundings as well as showcasing sustainability and environmental responsibility by using public transport.

Redundant Spaces

As part of our commitment to local communities, we have made redundant spaces in some of our station buildings available for use by local groups. We have a dedicated Community Rail Network Officer to support this project and we are keen to work with anyone interested in a community-based project. Some of our recent successes are below:

Norbiton

Kingston Hospital Radio has a new home. The team has moved into the ground floor of the former Station House at Norbiton Station. It is now sharing the building, which previously housed a taxi company, with the Jiu Jitsu Gym. This means that the entire former Station House has been relet and is being brought back into use to benefit the local community.

Mortlake

Discussions are taking place with a local food bank to use the redundant space at Mortlake Station. They hope to be using the space by mid-February.

Witley

Witley Station House has been completely refurbed and is ready to be let out to the local community on a peppercorn rent. Due to unforseen circumstances, the charity that was originally going to occupy the space has unfortunately not been able to do so. Sherborne Christmas Carols Steam Train

On Tuesday 6th December, for the first time since 2019, The Railway Touring Company's 'Sherborne Christmas Carols' excursion arrived into Sherborne from London Victoria, packed with travellers for the annual Christmas Carol Service in the Abbey. The train was hauled by a 'Black Five' steam locomotive, number 44871, built in 1945.

While the passengers were enjoying the carols, the train moved onto Yeovil Railway Centre to turn the locomotive on the turntable, ready for its return journey to London.

In celebration of this event, Friends of Templecombe Station hosted a fabulous Christmas Coffee Morning for steam buffs, rail users, and spectators as the steam train puffed through the station on its way to Sherborne. There were drinks, cakes, treats, and much more on offer.









Wool Christmas Tree Festival

Members of the parish church in Wool announced that they were holding a Christmas Tree Festival, inviting various volunteer groups in the village to supply a tree decorated to reflect their group's activities.

Friends of Wool Station rose to the challenge, installing a tree with a 'Great Railway Journeys' theme.

They hung the tree with colourful jackets and trousers in true Michael Portillo style, and took the opportunity to display their 'Stations in Bloom' certificate, and a 'help-yourself' tray of leaflets. The trees were on display during the week following Advent Sunday.

Habitats everywhere

Each of our stations can provide a unique habitat for local plants, animals, and insects to thrive. As part of our mission to increase biodiversity, we have been working closely with the RSPB to design seven 'wild gardens'.

Our vegetation team have started to make some of these changes, and over the next couple of months, we will be busy adding bird boxes, wildflower seeds, native species, and hedgehog homes to make our stations even more welcoming for nature.

Alton Local Food Initiative

Alton Station is home to the ALFI (Alton Local Food Initiative) plot. It has recently gained a new and improved access point, which allows it to be more accessible and safer than it was before. This can be seen in the photograph to the right.

Alton Local Food Initiative was formed in 2009 to encourage and enable people in the local community to be involved in growing, sourcing, and eating local, seasonal, and responsibly produced food. Alton Station is just one of their many plots.

Haslemere Bus Shelter

A vibrant gateway to Haslemere and its beautiful surrounding countryside has been complted with the renovation of a rundown bus shelter. The community has rallied around to transform the welcome for visitors stepping off the train and catching a bus at Haslemere. The new-look bus shelter, adorned with a colourful mural about the town and wider landscape, was unveiled in early October - a year after a large bus shelter across the road was also treated to a makeover.



The inspiring project has been a partnership between South Western Railway, Community Rail Network, South Downs National Park Authority, Surrey Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (ANOB), Stagecoach, and a team of dedicated local volunteers.

Dementia Friendly Try the Train

Try the Train events are run by SWR Community Ambassadors, and on 25th November 2022, Stacey Retter from Feniton Ticket Office had the pleasure of taking Dementia Friendly Honiton (Honiton Memory Cafe) on a Try the Train trip from Honiton to Axminster. They covered many topics including railcards, accessibility, ticketing, plus one of the ladies was telling them about how her husband used to be Station Master at Waterloo. 


Plaques
