# Spotlight on Sustainability

A large crowd of friends, colleagues, and supporters gathered at London Waterloo on Tuesday 14th March to see Operations Trainer Steve Wardle name a train in memory of his son Alex, who died tragically of Sudden Arrhythmic Death Syndrome (SADS) in 2016. The Alex Wardle Foundation was set up in memory of Alex, a medical student. It has worked tirelessly to raise awareness of SADS and to provide defibrillators for communities, and is now one of our charity partners at SWR. Steve unveiled the logo, alongside Claire Mann, on train number 444 023, with the number 23 having the added significance of being Alex's age when he passed away.

Alongside the unveiling, we also announced that we will be supporting the Foundation's work by installing defibrillators at all 154 staffed stations on our network. These will be placed as close as possible to the front entrances so they can be used day or night in the event of a cardiac arrest. As part of this initiative we have run awareness workshops, which 112 colleagues attended from across the network.





#### **Sustainability Heroes Awards**

On the 24th April, the Sustainability team held an event at the Barbican Conservatory in London for all the sustainability heroes internally and externally at SWR. The event included welcome drinks and a terrarium workshop which everyone got to take home, followed by lunch and speeches from some of SWR's directors and the Head of Sustainability, as well as Robin Hutchinson from The Community Brain. ## Swanage Railway Returns to Wareham

On Tuesday 4th April, the Swanage Railway ran their first train onto the mainline at Wareham, as part of a new trial for the Summer months between Swanage and Wareham. The trains are timetabled to connect with South Western Railway services from destinations such as London Waterloo, Southampton, Bournemouth, or Weymouth.

The trial service is running on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays until Sunday 10th September, with trains departing Wareham for Swanage at 11:19, 13:05, 15:19, and the The first arrival into Wareham being spectated by those attending to 17:19 which goes as far as Corfe Castle.

A large crowd of enthusiasts, members of the local community, and many more, gathered at Wareham Station to witness the first train arriving.

Swanage Railway had previously run trial services between the mainline at Wareham and their terminus of Swanage back in 2017, when they hired some rolling stock and locomotives from West Coast Railway Company. In 2018 and 2019, South Western Railway ran Summer Saturday services to Corfe Castle for steam train connections to Swanage.



The new service awaits departure from Wareham on the last train of the first day of operation, the 17:19 to Corfe Castle. Tuesday 4th April 2023.

#### **RSPB Arne Shuttle Bus Returns**

Also from Wareham, until Wednesday 30th August 2023, RSPB Dorset will run a shuttle bus service for a second trial period. The registered service 2RN (to Arne) will take passengers from Wareham station to RSPB Arne Nature Reserve. This year, it will also run from the Purbeck Park which includes Norden 'Park and Ride' and Norden Park link for the Swanage Railway service.

A trial last year proved the bus to be popular with those who want to leave the car behind and use sustainable transport options to visit the nature reserve.

#### Pinhoe's Planter

At Pinhoe, the furthest West station managed by SWR, a flowerbed of the station name, inspired by a similar one at Carbis Bay in Cornwall, has been installed by Network Rail Western for the Devon & Cornwall Rail Parnership. The flowerbed displays the station name 'Pinhoe' in stone letters; a welcoming first sight when arriving to the area by train. Whilst the flowerbed and stones itself were constructed and installed by Network Rail, funding was thanks to the Community Rail Development Fund and Cross Country's Community Engagement Fund. The planting was carried out by volunteers from the local Community Hub who are the station adopters.



#### Winchester Go LD Certificate

SWR and Hampshire CRP joined members of local charity Winchester Go LD at the Platform One cafe at Shawford station on Tuesday 25th April, for an evening of celebrating the success of the Travel with Confidence project.

The project helps members improve and develop their skills through different station visits, Try the Train trips, and a series of videos which break down the process of a rail journey into an easy-to-understand step-by-step guide.

## Launch of a great new children's educational book




